Food As Medicine for HIV (FAME-H) Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is the FAME-H Study?

FAME-H is an IRB-approved study (UNC IRB#: 20-3509) funded by the National Institutes of Health that includes Community Servings as the study site. Community Servings is working in partnership with the University of North Carolina School of Medicine and Massachusetts General Hospital to examine the impact of increasing access to healthy foods on health outcomes for people with HIV, diabetes and food insecurity.

Are you asking us to be a study site or participate in research?

No. Community Servings is the study site and all research activities will occur there. We are simply asking for you to send clinical referrals to our program as you have been. Our research team will then determine whether applicants are eligible for the study or another one of Community Servings' programs.

You can still refer patients to Community Servings through the usual referral processes (if you have referred to Community Servings before). Patients will continue to have access to Community Servings programs without study involvement.

How does Community Servings' involvement in this study affect patients we refer?

There will be no difference in the food delivery services provided to the patient as the result of study involvement. They may choose to continue receiving meals once the study is over. Depending on which group they are randomized into, they may also receive 20 phone counseling sessions over 12 months with a Registered Dietitian focusing on healthy eating for weight loss and blood sugar control.

How might my patient benefit from participating in the study?

Everyone who enrolls in the study will have increased access to healthful food. Both groups will receive medically tailored meals from Community Servings.

Participants will also receive an honorarium for their time. They will be offered three \$20 gift cards; the first after their six month study session, the second after their twelve month study session, and the third after their 18 month study session.

How can patients be referred?

Potential participants can be referred to Community Servings using the normal referral process.

How long does the study last?

Participants will be involved in the study for 18 months. The active intervention will be completed after twelve months. Follow-up questionnaires and labs will be collected six months after the intervention is over to determine the impact of the intervention.

Will I know if my patients are enrolled in the study?

Yes, those that enroll will consent to share their enrollment and any clinical results gathered by the study's VNA with their primary care provider.
